Answer Key

- 1. The villagers are afraid of the giant because he is always cross.
- 2. When the giant is angry, he stamps his feet, causing the houses in the village to shake.
- 3. Kipper liked the television programme about the giant and when it had finished he went looking for Chip and found the key.
- 4. The giant is initially angry and shouts at Kipper when they first meet, demonstrating his usual behavior.
- 5. Kipper helps the giant by picking up his things and putting a bandage on his head, which are acts of simple kindness and care.
- 6. The giant is surprised by Kipper's kindness and stops being angry, beginning his transformation.
- 7. The giant realizes that he can be friends with the villagers, which is a contrast to his previous hostile behavior.
- 8. The giant's change of heart leads to a party where he and the villagers celebrate together.
- 9. The villagers are happy that the giant is no longer angry and they all join in the celebration.
- 10. The story communicates a message about the power of kindness and friendship to overcome fear and hostility.

Glossary of Key Terms

Cross: Irritable or bad-tempered. In the story, it is used to describe the giant's disposition before Kipper's arrival.

Stamp: To bring one's foot down heavily on the ground, often expressing anger or frustration. This is the giant's way of expressing anger.

Kindness: The quality of being friendly, generous, and considerate. This is Kipper's main character trait and the source of his influence on the giant.

Compassion: The feeling of sympathy and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others. Kipper shows this to the giant when he helps him.

Hostility: Unfriendly or aggressive behavior. This is how the villagers perceive the giant at the beginning of the story.

Transformation: A marked change in form, nature, or appearance. This is what occurs in the giant after his interaction with Kipper.

Community: A group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic in common. The village is the community in the story.

Acceptance: The action of consenting to receive or undertake something offered; the quality of being accepted. The giant seeks acceptance from the villagers, and they offer it after his change.

Courage: The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. Kipper shows courage by facing the giant when others fear him.

Friendship: The emotions or conduct of friends; the state of being friends. Friendship is the theme that resolves the conflict between the giant and the villagers.
